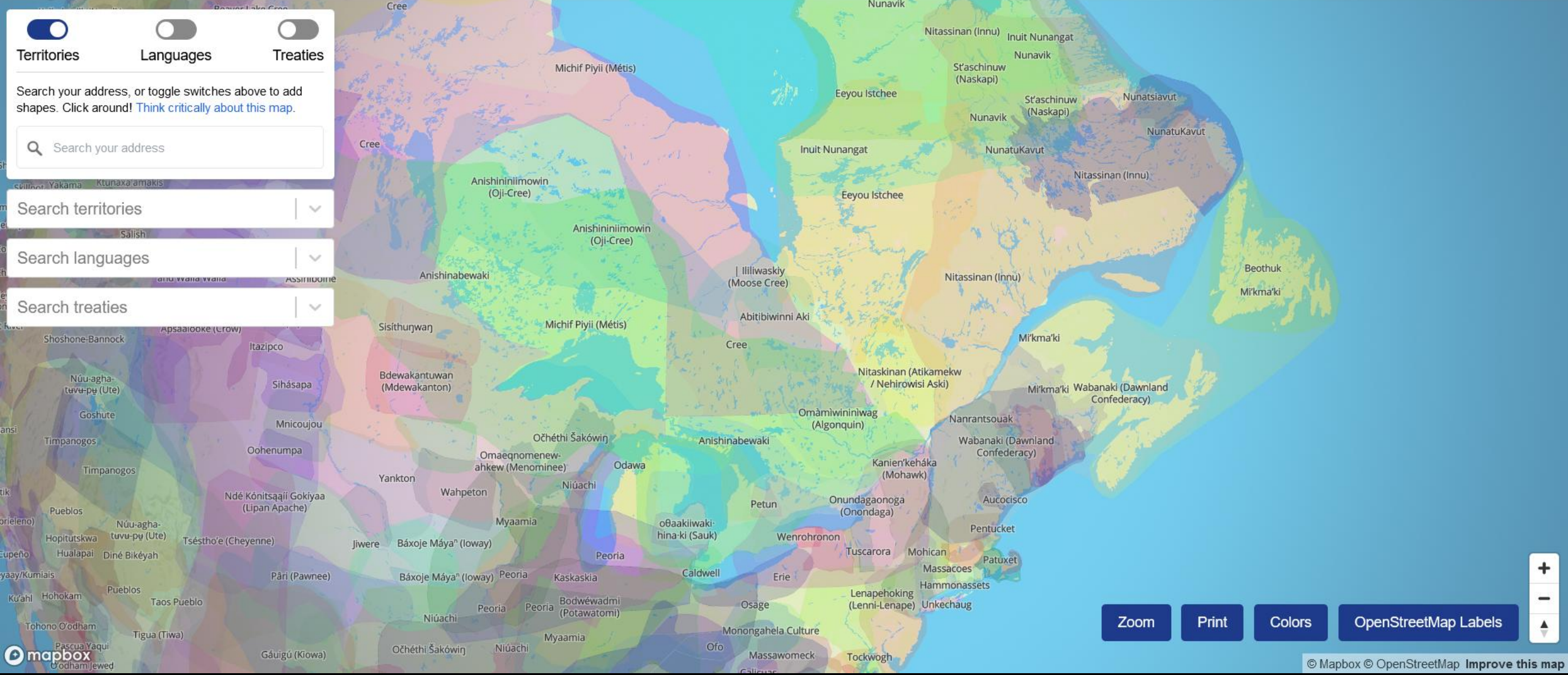



Immigrant Status According to the 2021 Census, 4,303,385 people, that is, 23.0% of the population, were Foreign-born (Immigrants) (2,342,125 (14.4%) were Canadian-born (non-immigrants) and 1,961,260 were non-permanent residents.

Recent Immigrants Among immigrants in 2021, 1,328,240 came between 2016 and 2021. These recent immigrants made up 15.3% of the immigrant population.

Place of birth The top three places of birth among immigrants living in Canada in 2021 were India, the Philippines, and China. Among recent immigrants living in Canada, they were India, the Philippines, and China.

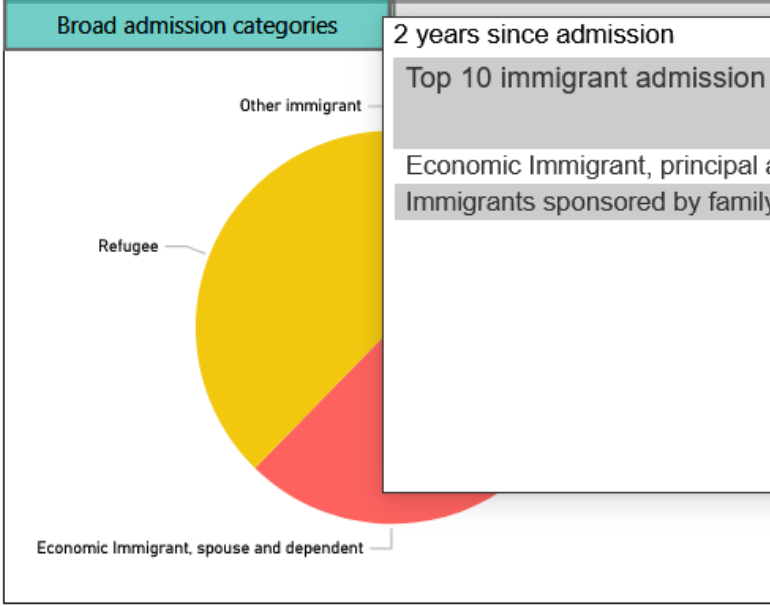

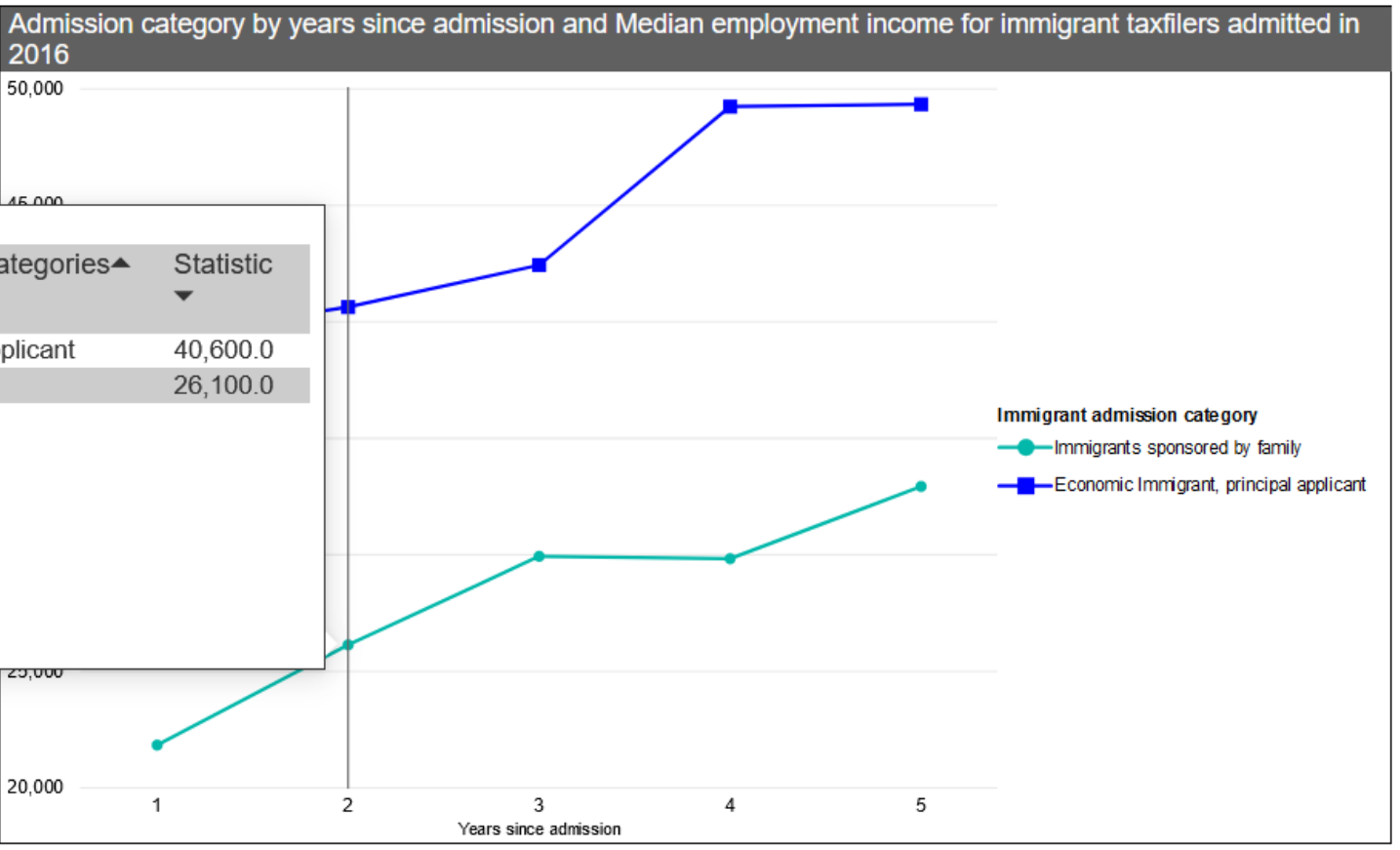

Using a phenomenological approach, this thesis examined the ways in which Syrian men experience changes in the culture of gender relations in Canada. This study aimed to understand how Syrian men perceive Canadian gender norms and struggle to adapt to them, to inform the design of immigrant support services to help immigrants to Canada to adopt more equitable understandings of gender. The research used qualitative methods supported by in-depth semi-structured interviews with 19 Syrian straight cis-gendered men and with 5 staff members from settlement organizations in Halifax (ISANS, YMCA). Using Maslow's Hierarchy of needs model helped me to locate which 'level of needs' has been addressed by settlement programs. The results showed that most men participants try to conform to Canadian dominant gender norms, either consciously or unconsciously. Focusing on male position and masculinity fosters more equitable gender relations within immigrants' families and more broadly in Canadian

ATLANTIC IMMIGRATION SPOTLIGHT ON DATA



COUNTRIES OF ORIGIN FOR IMMIGRANTS IN ATLANTIC CANADA

Atlantic Canada is becoming increasingly diverse through immigration.

While many immigrants to the region have come from Western countries, especially the United Kingdom and United States, recent immigrants are more likely to come from Asia.

Immigrants from the Philippines, India, Syria, and China comprise about a quarter (24%) of the total immigrant population but nearly half (45%) of recent immigrants (i.e. landed between 2016 and 2021). Programming that focuses on intercultural awareness and cultural exchange can help to build bridges between newcomers and longer-term residents.

These graphs show the top countries of origin for immigrants in Atlantic Canada as of 2021. They combine data for the four Atlantic provinces based on:

- **Place of birth.** Each graph shows the **top seven places of birth**; this is not an exhaustive list of birth countries. For Figure 1, the top countries account for 54% of the immigrant population. For Figure 2, the top countries account for 58% of the recent immigrant population.
- **Period of immigration.** Each graph presents data for a different period of immigration. Figure 1 shows data for **all immigrants** in the Atlantic region as of 2021. Figure 2 shows data for **recent immigrants** in the region. "Recent immigrants" are those who received landed immigrant or permanent resident status from January 2016 to May 2021.
- **2021 census data.** Data is extracted from Canada's 2021 Census of Population and is accurate to May 2021. It does not include immigrants who landed in Canada after that date.

WHAT DOES THE DATA SAY?

- For both periods of immigration, many of the **top countries of origin are the same** (six out of seven). However, their **ranking** changes considerably. For all immigrants, the United Kingdom and United States outrank the following countries by a wide margin. For recent immigrants, the Philippines and India lead while Syria and China follow by a narrower margin.
- Immigration in Atlantic Canada is shifting from **Western to non-Western countries of origin**. For all immigrants, the United Kingdom and United States represent more than a quarter (26%) of the immigrant population; for recent immigrants, they account for only 6% of the population. At the same time, the Philippines, India, Syria, China, and Nigeria make up over half (51%) of recent immigrants.
- Immigration is a factor in **increasing ethno-cultural diversity**. While nationality does not necessarily correspond with ethnicity or culture, many recent immigrants come from countries that are demographically largely non-white.

WHAT DOES THE DATA MEAN FOR SETTLEMENT AND INTEGRATION?

- Atlantic Canada is one of the least diverse parts of the country. According to the 2021 Census, only **7% of the population in Atlantic Canada identify as visible minorities**; in contrast, more than a quarter (27%) of Canada's population identify as visible minorities. Through immigration, however, the region is becoming increasingly diverse.
- Settlement service providers can **help newcomers adapt** to Atlantic Canada by providing services and programs informed by the region's culture and demography. For example, programming may highlight Canadian or regional values, histories, and multiculturalism. Services can also explore racism and other forms of discrimination, how newcomers can identify and respond to racism, and the legal frameworks that protect individuals and groups against discrimination.
- **Programming that engages the broader community** can make Atlantic Canada a more welcoming place for newcomers. Intercultural training and antiracism education can inform people about cultural, ethnic, and religious diversity; challenge misconceptions or prejudices; and provide strategies for conflict management. Furthermore, community outreach can facilitate positive and productive encounters between newcomers and longer-term residents. Examples include multicultural festivals, matching programs, community gardens, and many Local Immigration Partnership initiatives.

GENDER WAGE GAP FOR ECONOMIC IMMIGRANTS IN ATLANTIC CANADA

A gender wage gap exists for economic immigrants in Atlantic Canada.

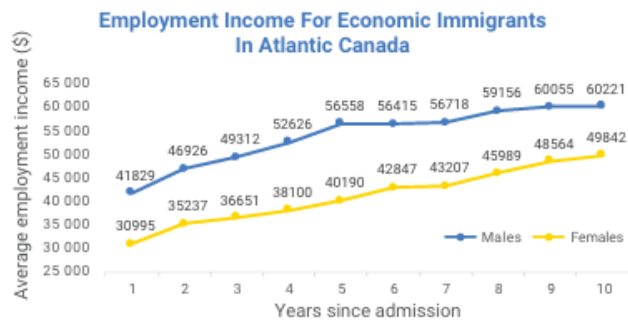
Immigrant women earn on average between \$0.71 and \$0.83 for every \$1 earned by immigrant men.

While average employment income increases over time for both women and men, the wage gap remains relatively stable. Average employment income can indicate service need (i.e. targeted services for immigrant women) and can be used as a measure of economic integration. ARAISA 2024

This graph compares employment income for economic immigrants in Atlantic Canada. It combines data for the four Atlantic provinces based on:

- **Median employment income**, which is disaggregated for **gender**. By excluding other income sources, it provides a meaningful comparison of men's and women's earnings in the workplace.
- **Economic immigrants, principal applicants**. Focusing on principal applicants provides a fairer comparison between men and women. Women are more likely to be secondary applicants; including both primary and secondary applicants would result in a biased comparison of men and women.
- **2011 admission year**. This is the earliest cohort available. It was selected to show how employment income changes over time.

NEWCOMER RETENTION IN ATLANTIC CANADA

In comparison to the rest of Canada, immigrant retention is low across the Atlantic region. However, retention rates vary for newcomer populations.

While the five-year regional retention rate is less than half (44%) for economic immigrants, it is much higher (79%) for refugees.

Investing in programs to support the integration of those who arrive as refugees may have long-term benefits for growth in the Atlantic region. Moreover, the fact that most out-migrants leave Atlantic Canada suggests that retention is a regional rather than provincial issue.

WHAT IS THE DATA?

The following graphs compare retention rates for newcomers in Atlantic Canada. They present combined data for the Atlantic provinces based on:

- **Admission category**. Each graph compares retention rates for two immigrant admission categories: **economic immigrants** and **refugees**.
- **Provincial and regional retention**. The graphs show two types of retention. Figures 1 and 2 show **provincial retention rates** for Atlantic Canada. Figure 1 shows the combined average retention rate for the Atlantic provinces. Figure 2 shows the five-year retention rate for each province. Provincial retention is the percentage of newcomers who stay in their intended province (for example, those admitted to New Brunswick who continue to live in New Brunswick). Figure 3 shows the **regional retention rate**. This includes newcomers who stay in their intended province as well as those who move from one Atlantic province to another. For example, it includes newcomers who intended to live in Prince Edward Island but later moved to Nova Scotia.
- **2016 admission year**. This is the most recent cohort for which a five-year retention rate is available. It was selected to provide recent data while also showing how retention changes over time. It was also selected because Atlantic Canada admitted a large number of refugees in comparison to other years (notably, Canada admitted many Syrian refugees during this period).
